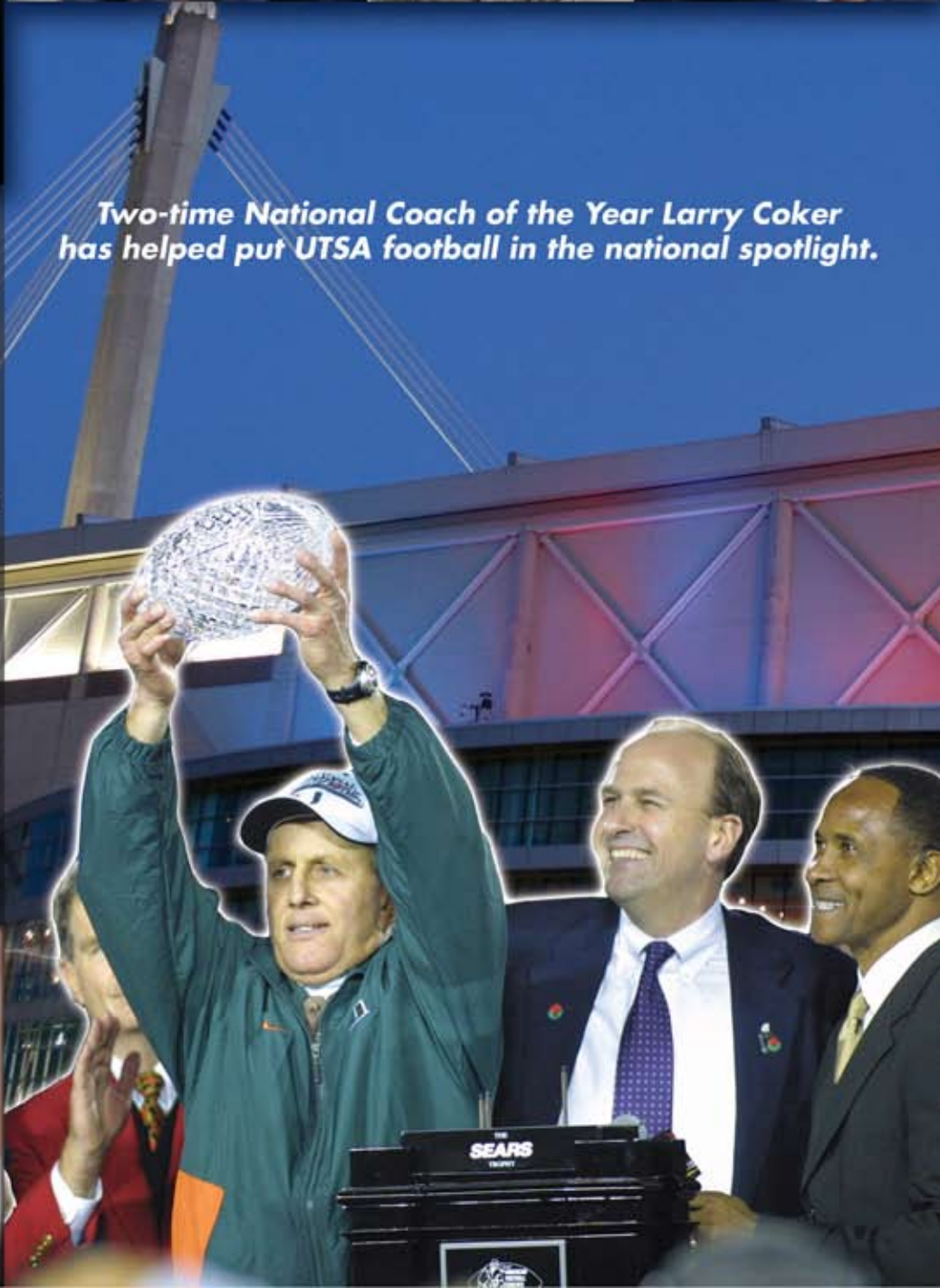

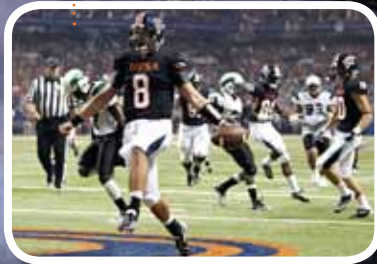


# PROGRAM



FOX Sports Southwest launched a new reality sports documentary series that chronicled the start of UTSA's inaugural football season.

UTSA kicked off its inaugural season with a 31-3 victory over Northeastern State before an NCAA start-up program record crowd of 56,743 at the Alamodome.

More than 4,000 fans were in attendance for the inaugural UTSA Football Fiesta Spring Game presented by Health Texas at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners rolled past Minot State, 49-7, in its season finale. The game drew 32,369 fans and that helped UTSA break the NCAA record for average attendance for a first-year program. The Roadrunners welcomed 35,521 fans per game to the Alamodome in their inaugural campaign.

Enthusiasm to begin with, UTSA President Ricardo Romo was on the verge of tearing out his hair.

And Larry Coker? With the many one-liners he fired off during Friday's conversation, he might have been considered a stand-up act rather than participating in his introduction as UTSA's first football coach.

"They talked to me every people. I think they were just touch with a girl I dated in the words grade," Coker joked.

It was that kind of day at the University of Texas at San Antonio's event center — job hard to figure as the school's faculty spent to start a college football team finally began to take its first steps.

Coker, 60, had coached in two years since he was fired out of the University of Miami

where he won 60 games and the 2001 Bowl Championship Series title while he was at the University of Miami. UTSA President Ricardo Romo is in the background.

### THE ROTATION COLLEGE

For UTSA, football isn't far away—and neither is winning

Yes, they're ready for football in San Antonio. The nation's seventh largest city doesn't have an NFL franchise or a Division I football team, but it has 28,000-plus students at Texas-San Antonio who voted not once but twice to increase their fees to help fund the school's startup program.

Larry Coker, who won a national title at the other end of the spectrum earlier this decade at Miami, was hired to make it all work. On the day he was introduced last month, more than 500 UTSA students delayed leaving for spring break and packed the press conference to show their support for a team that won't begin playing (in Division I-AA) until 2011.

"I really questioned their sanity," Coker says. No one, however, should question Coker's ability to get it done. There's too much high school talent in the state of Texas, and Coker, 60, has too many friends in the coaching community helping him out. Among the grizzled Florida Atlantic's Howard Schnellenberger, a guy who knows a little about building programs.

Schnellenberger reconnected a Miami program that was months from shutting down and won a national title there in 1983 before moving on to run around Louisville, where his 1990 team was the school's first 10-game winner. Now he has FAU—entering its fourth full Division I season—at the top of the Sun Belt Conference.

His advice to Coker: Believe in what you're doing.

"They have the Spurs here; they understand winning," Coker says. "There will be a grace period, but there will come a time when we need to show we can win. And we will."

# PARK WEST ATHLETICS COMPLEX

## Quick Facts



The 60-acre complex will be built in phases near UTSA's Main Campus on a university-owned tract of land located just inside Loop 1604 near Hausman Road and Kyle Seale Parkway.



When all phases are completed, the complex will feature NCAA Division I-quality stadiums:

- Baseball (4,000 seats)
- Softball (1,500 seats)
- Soccer (5,000 seats)
- Track (5,000 seats)
- Tennis (1,500 seats)



The complex will feature two multi-purpose lighted practice facilities that will be used by the football program.



The complex will include a building that will house office space for coaches and staff, locker rooms, a training room and a strength and conditioning center.

## Economic Impact



The complex will generate nearly \$200 million for the local economy during three years of construction and the initial five years of operation.



The first five years of operation will generate an estimated \$63 million in sports tourism spending, as UTSA will work with the city, county and San Antonio Sports to recruit and co-host tourist-destination events in the complex.



UTSA's athletics program currently contributes more than \$27 million annually to the local economy, including operations and the existing sports-tourism base.



The Park West Athletics Complex soccer (above) and track & field (below) facilities will be completed in June 2013.





UTSA officially broke ground at the Park West Athletics Complex on April 10, 2012. UTSA President Dr. Ricardo Romo, UTSA Director of Athletics Lynn Hickey, University of Texas System Board of Regents Chairman of the Board William Eugene Powell, District 25 Texas State Senator Jeff Wentworth, Bexar County Judge Nelson Wolff, County Commissioner Kevin Wolff, San Antonio Mayor Julián Castro and City Councilman Reed Williams all attended the groundbreaking along with the UTSA Marching Band and Roadrunners student-athletes.

## ABOUT UTSA



The University of Texas at San Antonio was founded on June 5, 1969, by the Texas Legislature to be a "university of the first class."



UTSA serves the San Antonio metropolitan area and the broader region of South Texas through programs and services offered from its four campuses: Main Campus, Downtown Campus, Hemisfair Park Campus and Park West Campus.



With more than 31,000 students enrolled in 135 undergraduate and graduate degree programs, UTSA is the third-largest component in The University of Texas System.



UTSA lists an enrollment of 30,968 (26,268 undergraduates) for Spring 2012, making it the eighth-largest school in the state of Texas.



UTSA offers 135 degree programs at the bachelor's, master's and doctoral levels in the colleges of Architecture, Business, Education and Human Development, Engineering, Honors, Liberal and Fine Arts, Public Policy, Sciences and in the Graduate School.



The university's four campuses provide access and opportunity for large numbers of historically underserved students. More than half of UTSA's students come from groups underrepresented in higher education. Many students are the first in their families to attend college or university.



As the region's largest generator of engineers, artists, business professionals, teachers, scientists and technology managers, UTSA has produced more than 81,000 graduates since awarding its first degree in 1974.



UTSA has a total of 622 budgeted tenure/tenure-track faculty positions. Ninety-eight percent of full-time faculty hold doctorates or equivalent terminal degrees. UTSA has a total of 40 endowed academic positions, a measure of academic excellence. They include 15 distinguished chairs, six chairs, six distinguished professorships, nine professorships and one faculty fellowship.



In addition to the educational advantages UTSA offers, its economic impact directly and indirectly produces 1.2 billion in annual business revenues and supports an estimated 15,720 jobs in the San Antonio metropolitan statistical area. Purchases by UTSA in 2011 totaled \$78 million, with \$16.8 million or 21 percent designated or obtained from historically underutilized business (HUB) vendors.

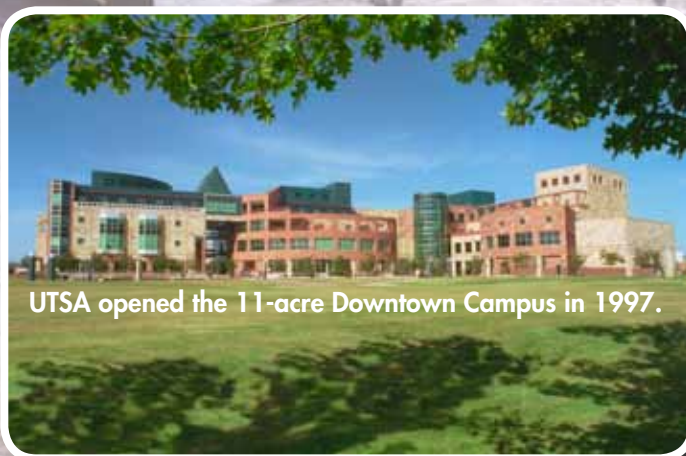


Dr. Ricardo Romo, a San Antonio native, became UTSA's fifth president in 1999 and is the first Hispanic president in the university's history.

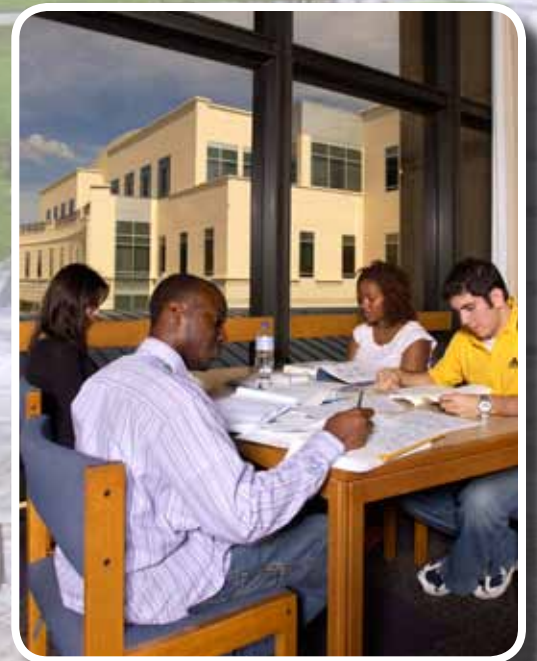
**LAUREL VILLAGE**



UTSA has four housing complexes on its Main Campus offering several styles of group living. On-campus housing accommodates approximately 3,700 students. Students living on-campus are close to classrooms, the student center, food courts, library, athletics facilities and the student recreation center.

Chaparral Village and Laurel Village are the two newest on-campus residences and both offer two- and four-bedroom suites with cable television, high speed Internet and kitchenettes, study rooms, a computer lab, a swimming pool and basketball courts. A new 618-bed residence — San Saba Hall — currently is under construction.

The UTSA Libraries offer personalized research assistance and a wide variety of study spaces through locations at the Main Campus, Downtown Campus and the HemisFair Park Campus. Students have access to 1.8 million volumes, including 800,000 e-books, 70,000 serial subscriptions, more than 300 online databases and 54,000 audiovisual items.



The Recreation and Wellness Center is a state-of-the-art 300,000 square-foot facility housing a wide variety of programs and facilities from fitness and aquatics centers, basketball, racquetball and beach volleyball courts to massage studios and a rock-climbing wall.

# CAMPUS REC

The UTSA Recreation & Wellness Center is one of the largest campus recreation centers in the state of Texas, containing nearly 300,000 square feet of indoor and outdoor space. The facility consists of six program areas — fitness and wellness, open recreation, intramural sports, club sports, outdoor pursuits and aquatics.



The UTSA Recreation & Wellness Center houses more than 24,000 square feet of weight and cardio space.

Campus Recreation offers personal training, fitness assessments, nutritional guidance and group exercise for no additional fee. Group exercise consists of more than 25 classes ranging from yoga to kickboxing.



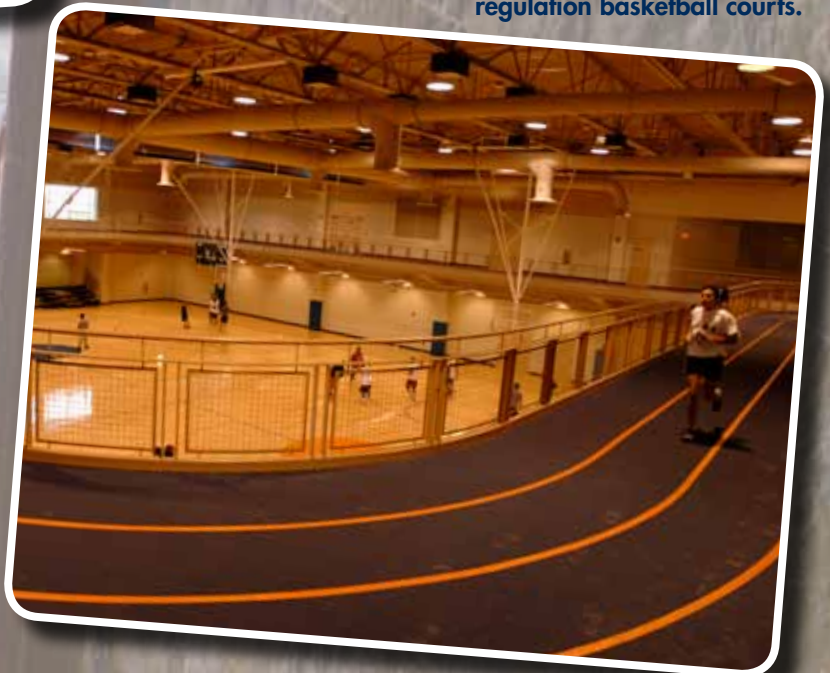
The 18,000 square-foot cardio room features numerous machines ranging from tread mills, ellipticals and stationary bikes to rowers and spin bikes.



The Outdoor Aquatics Center features a three-lane lap pool, leisure pool, lazy river, hot tubs, ample lounge space, a pair of beach volleyball courts and a basketball court.



The jogging track, one-sixth of a mile in length, circles above four regulation basketball courts.



The 54-foot rock-climbing wall is the largest of its kind on any campus in the state of Texas.

### ACADEMIC SUCCESS

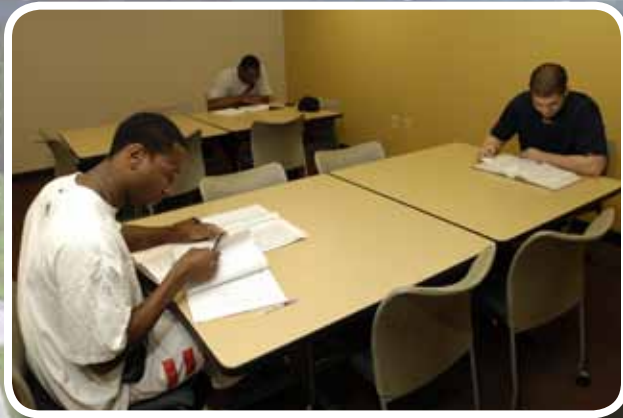

A league-best 27 Roadrunners have been named Southland Conference Student-Athlete of the Year in their respective sports, the league's top honor for academic and athletics success. UTSA has had 15 student-athletes chosen as a Capitol One Academic All-American, one of the top honors that can be bestowed upon a collegiate athlete, while 31 have earned Academic All-District accolades since 2003. In the last nine years, 696 student-athletes have been named to the Southland Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll, including a school-record 131 in the 2010-11 academic year.





# ACADEMICS

In April 2009, a state-of-the-art academic learning center opened its doors to UTSA student-athletes. The 4,000 square-foot James and Catherine Bodenstedt Athletic Learning Center houses five study carrels, two large conference rooms, a classroom, computer lab and office space for the Academic Services staff.

He also was the Interim Director from July 2008-January 2009.

While in Blacksburg, Howlett was responsible for developing and implementing academic success programs and providing academic, career and personal counseling to student-athletes in the sports of football, men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's and women's soccer and women's volleyball. He also assisted in the planning and development of the department's Learning Assistance Program, served as the liaison to the Registrar's Office and to the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities and helped coordinate the tutorial, peer mentor and study hall programs for all student-athletes.

Prior to his tenure at Virginia Tech, Howlett was an Academic/Athletic Counselor at Maine from 1996-97. He also spent two years at Austin Peay where he served as an Academic Services Intern from 1994-95 and as the Interim Compliance Coordinator for six months before joining the staff at Maine.

Howlett earned his bachelor's degree in business administration with an emphasis on human resource management from Susquehanna University in 1990. He received a master's degree in health and physical education with an emphasis in athletic administration from Southern Mississippi in 1994.

## STUDENT-ATHLETE CAREER SERVICES

### Connecting UTSA Student-Athletes to Career Development Resources

The mission of the UTSA University Career Center is to assist students and alumni in identifying and developing the skills necessary to pursue lifelong career goals.

The Career Center provides comprehensive career planning, job search skill development and a wide range of tools and resources designed to assist students and alumni in conducting a successful job search.

The Career Center's website, *hireroadrunners.com*, contains full-time professional, internship, co-op, work-study and part-time job listings, which are updated daily.

Dozens of employers visit campus each year to interview UTSA students for full-time professional positions, as well as intern, co-op and other jobs. Multiple career fairs are held each semester and are attended by hundreds of employers from a variety of disciplines. These events offer information on full- and part-time jobs, internships and more.

The Career Center employs a total of 11 career counselors, one of which, Stefanie Cisneros, is dedicated to serving student-athletes at UTSA. Individual career counseling appointments are available with counselors to discuss any aspect of your career development. They will use a variety of methods to help you learn more about career interests, including free online career assessments.

In addition, career counselors can assist you in developing job search skills such as resumé writing, interview preparation and networking skills. Throughout the year, a variety of workshops are offered on various career-related topics, including several designed specifically for student-athletes.

Stefanie Cisneros is in her fifth year as career counselor for all UTSA student-athletes and her 12th year as a staff member at the UTSA Career Center Office.

During her tenure, Cisneros has had the opportunity to speak to national audiences through professional presentations at the Southern Association of Colleges and Employers Annual Conference, the American Humanics Management Institute, the California Association for Counseling and Development Regional Conference and as a co-presenter at the National Careers Conference. Her most recent presentation, "Transfer the Magic from Playing Field to Career Field", addressed the career development needs of student-athletes and best practices for working effectively with student-athlete populations and athletics departments.

Cisneros is currently involved in several professional organizations, including memberships in the National Career Development Association (NCDA), Southern Association of Colleges and Employers (SoACE), National Association for Colleges and Employers (NACE) and the Texas Cooperative Education and Internship Association (TXCEIA).

Cisneros graduated from UTSA in 2001 with a bachelor of science degree in kinesiology and completed a master of arts degree in community counseling from UTSA in 2008.



# ATHLETIC MEDICINE

The UTSA Athletic Training Department is committed to providing the highest standard of sports medicine care to all Roadrunners student-athletes. This includes education, prevention, evaluation, recognition, treatment and rehabilitation of injuries and illnesses associated with athletic participation. Referral necessary for additional medical and psychological evaluation and treatment is also provided. The athletics training staff is dedicated to this mission and compliance with UTSA, Southland Conference and NCAA rules and regulations.

The UTSA training staff works under the direction of Associate Athletics Director for Athletic Medicine, Jerry Greeson. All of the physicians that work with the training staff come from the University of Texas Health Science Center Medical School and those physicians, along with selected non-physicians, compose the sports medicine team.

The training staff is responsible for the care, prevention and rehabilitation of athletic injuries, taping and wrapping procedures, emergency situations should they occur, attendance of practices and home and away events that occur to 16 intercollegiate sports. UTSA student-athletes receive care from a centralized training center which has state-of-the-art therapeutic modalities and rehabilitation equipment to give student-athletes the best care available.

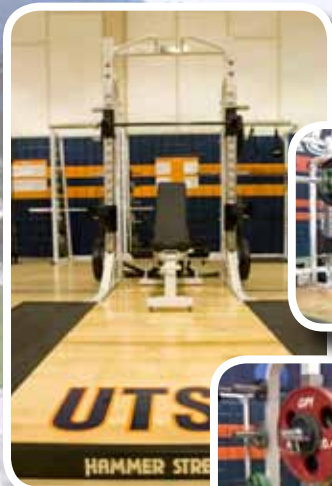

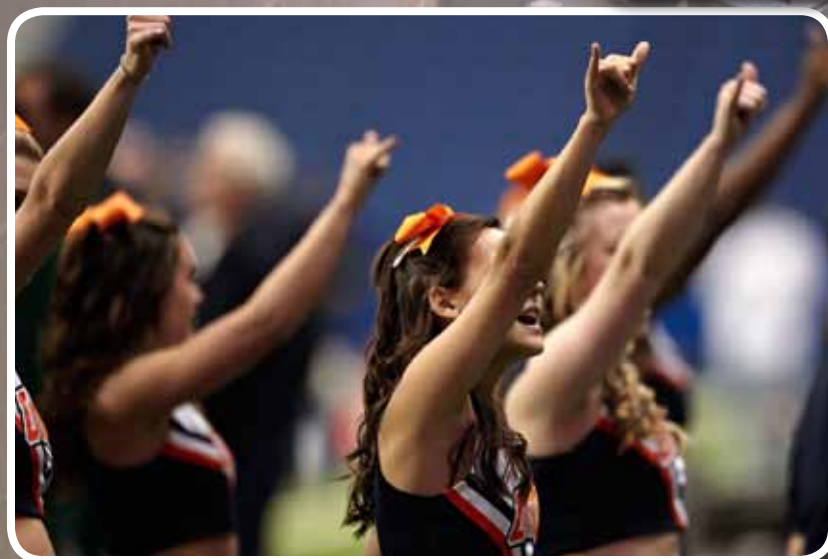


## THE MASCOT

# ALAMODOME

With a seating capacity of more than 65,000 that includes 56 suites, the facility has hosted an array of annual football games, including the Valero Alamo Bowl, the *Dave Campbell's Texas Football Classic* and the U.S. Army All-American Bowl along with serving as the home of the UTSA Roadrunners. The Alamodome, the home of the Dallas Cowboys Training Camp four times in the last five years, has hosted three Big 12 Championship Games and served as the home stadium for the New Orleans Saints, who were displaced because of Hurricane Katrina during much of the 2005 NFL season.

# NCAA COMPLIANCE

## THE NCAA RULES AND FANS

Compliance with NCAA rules is one of the highest priorities for our athletics program and institution. As a member of the NCAA, the University of Texas at San Antonio is accountable for the actions of its boosters and fans. Even the best-intentioned action on a fan's part may be a violation of NCAA rules. Please contact the UTSA Compliance Office if you have any questions concerning what is permissible. ## REPRESENTATIVES OF ATHLETICS INTERESTS

A "representative of UTSA's athletics interests," or booster, is anyone who:

- Has ever participated in or is currently a member of the various athletics department support groups;
- Has made a donation to the athletics program;
- Has helped arrange summer and/or vacation employment for student-athletes; or
- Has been involved, in anyway, in the promotion of UTSA's athletics program

## EXTRA BENEFITS

Prospective and current student-athletes may not receive extra benefits. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or representative of the institution's athletic interests to provide a student-athlete or his/her family a benefit not authorized by NCAA legislation. Extra benefits would include, but are not limited to:

- An employment arrangement for a prospect's relatives;
- Gifts of clothing or equipment;
- Cosigning of loans;
- Providing loans to a prospect's relatives or friends;
- Cash or like items;
- Use of an automobile;
- Any tangible items, including merchandise;
- Free or reduced-cost services, rentals or purchases of any type;
- Free or reduced-cost housing
- Use of a college's athletic equipment;
- Sponsorship of or arrangement for an awards banquet for high school, prep school or two-year college athletes by a college, athletics representative or its alumni groups;
- Employment of a student-athlete at a rate higher than the wages paid for similar work; and
- Payment to a student-athlete for work not performed.

## RECRUITING

Only coaches and athletics department staff may be involved in the recruiting process. Athletic representatives are prohibited from contacting a prospective student-athlete or members of his/her family by telephone, letter, e-mail, or in person for the purpose of encouraging participation in athletics at The University of Texas at San Antonio. This includes contacting prospective student-athletes on social media (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) The prohibition remains in effect even after the prospect signs a national letter-of-intent (scholarship offer). You can do your part by forwarding names of any potential recruits to the UTSA coaching staffs.

## PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETE

A prospective student-athlete is a person who has started classes for the ninth grade. You can become a prospect even if you have not started the ninth grade, if a college gives you or your relatives any financial aid help or other benefits that it does not give others.

Before a prospect can make an official visit to UTSA, he/she must present (1) a score from a PSAT, SAT or ACT test (through an official high school or testing agency), (2) an academic transcript, and (3) must register with the NCAA Eligibility Center and must be placed on the institution's Institution Request List with the NCAA Eligibility Center.

## VISITING UTSA

### OFFICIAL VISIT:

An "official visit" is a visit paid in whole or in part by the university and cannot exceed 48 hours in length. A prospect can make a total of five official visits, with a limit of only one per university.

### UNOFFICIAL VISIT:

An "unofficial visit" is a visit made at the prospect's own expense. The university may provide (a) three complimentary tickets to an on-campus athletics event in which the university's team is competing and (b) transportation to view off-campus practice and competition sites within a 30-mile radius. Prospects can make as many unofficial visits as they want.

UTSA posted a 4-6 record and established an NCAA startup program record average home attendance of 35,521 as a Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) independent.

### **May 4, 2012**

UTSA received and accepted an invitation to join Conference USA beginning on July 1, 2013.

### **Fall 2012**

UTSA will play 12 games against FCS and Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) opponents, including a full WAC schedule of six contests. The Roadrunners will not count as an FBS opponent toward FBS eligibility.

### **Fall 2013**

The Roadrunners will play 12 games against FBS opponents, including a full Conference USA schedule. UTSA must meet all FBS requirements and will count as an FBS opponent toward FBS eligibility.

## UTSA MEDIA POLICY

### **MEDIA COVERAGE**

The UTSA Athletics Communications Office assists members of the media with their coverage of all 17 Roadrunners sports by coordinating interviews and providing feature ideas, notes, statistics and any other information needed. Media members may check the athletics department's website — [goUTSA.com](http://goUTSA.com) — for the latest information on all UTSA sports.

### **FOOTBALL SEASON CREDENTIALS**

Season credentials for UTSA home games must be requested by emailing Associate Athletics Communications Director Brian Hernandez ([brian.hernandez1@utsa.edu](mailto:brian.hernandez1@utsa.edu)). Only media covering the Roadrunners on a consistent basis and on assignment will be considered for season credentials. A lost season credential will result in credentials being issued on a game-by-game basis, as available. The deadline for requesting season credentials for the 2012 season is Friday, Aug. 24.

### **FOOTBALL SINGLE-GAME CREDENTIALS**

Credentials for individual home games should be requested by 5 p.m. Wednesday of the respective week and emailed to Associate Athletics Communications Director Brian Hernandez ([brian.hernandez1@utsa.edu](mailto:brian.hernandez1@utsa.edu)). Credentials only will be granted to media on assignment. For UTSA road games, please contact Assistant AD for Communications Kyle Stephens ([kyle.stephens@utsa.edu](mailto:kyle.stephens@utsa.edu)) for more information and deadlines.

### **NON-FOOTBALL CREDENTIALS**

Media wishing to apply for credentials to cover other UTSA home events should send a request to the Athletics Communications Director for the sport they wish to cover at least 24 hours prior to the event. These credentials WILL NOT allow access to cover UTSA home football games.

### **CREDENTIAL PICK-UP**

Credentials can be mailed upon request or picked up in person with proper identification

at the Athletics Communications Office, which is located at 5710 West Hausman Road, Suite 101 in the University Heights Tech Center. For home football games, media that has not yet received credentials may pick those up beginning three hours prior to kickoff at the Alamodome Media Entrance (east 50-yard line).

### **FOOTBALL GAME DAY PARKING**

Media may park in Lot A (south of Alamodome/northwest corner of IH-10 & Cesar E. Chavez Boulevard interchange) with a UTSA Football Game Day Parking Pass only. Requests must be made to Assistant AD for Communications Kyle Stephens and/or Associate Athletics Communications Director Brian Hernandez at least one week in advance. Passes are issued on a single-game basis only and there are limited quantities per game. There are no season parking passes for UTSA football games. Satellite trucks may park in Lot A for a fee and must reserve spaces by contacting Jason

### NON-GAME DAY MEDIA PARKING

Media needing to drive onto UTSA's Main Campus for interviews may request a visitor parking permit by contacting the UTSA Athletics Communications Director for the sport they are covering at least 24 hours in advance of arrival. Free parking is available for football practice media availability at Dub Farris Stadium.

### ALAMODOME ACCESS

All media members must enter the Alamodome through the media entrance located on the east 50-yard line. The entrance and all press work areas will open three hours prior to kickoff. No media members will be allowed to enter the Alamodome through the South Loading Dock. A UTSA-issued credential or game ticket is required for entrance to all home football games.

### PRESS BOX SERVICES

The Alamodome press box, located on Level 3 of the east side of the facility, will open three hours prior to kickoff for all home football games. A UTSA-issued credential is required for entrance to the press box. The media meal will be served approximately two hours prior to kickoff. Game notes, flip cards, game programs, official stats, notes and quotes will be provided. Wireless Internet access is complimentary for working media members upon registration at the media entrance. Media members who wish to order a dedicated Internet connection or telephone line must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at [jbippert@alamodome.com](mailto:jbippert@alamodome.com) or (210) 207-3629. Seats will be assigned according to UTSA's credential criteria.

### LIVE STATISTICS

UTSA will provide live statistics online at [goUTSA.com](http://goUTSA.com) for all home events and real-time statistics to credentialed media through a private URL that will be provided on football game days.

### PHOTOGRAPHERS/VIDEOGRAPHERS

Photographers and videographers on assignment are welcome to shoot all UTSA home events with proper credentials requested through the Athletics Communications Office. For sideline access at home football games, photographers and videographers will be required to check in for a photo vest. A work room is located in Meeting Room A near the northeast tunnel to the field, and it will be equipped with complimentary wireless Internet access, flip cards, game programs and refreshments. Photographers who wish to order a dedicated Internet

connection must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at [jbippert@alamodome.com](mailto:jbippert@alamodome.com) or (210) 207-3629. Photographers and videographers will not have a reserved seat in the Alamodome press box. Upper photo and video area requests should be made in the press box at least two hours prior to kickoff.

### POSTGAME INTERVIEW ROOMS

Postgame interview rooms for all home football games are located on the east side of the Alamodome across from the visiting team locker room on Level 1. UTSA will hold a postgame press conference for head coach Larry Coker and selected players after a 10-minute cooling off period. Additional requested coaches and players will be made available in the UTSA interview room following the press conference. The UTSA locker room is closed and there will be no interviews conducted on the field except for the television network that is broadcasting the game. The visiting team interview room is located immediately adjacent to the UTSA interview room. All requests should be made with the visiting team's SID. UTSA will provide escorts for media to the sidelines with six minutes remaining in the fourth quarter and to the postgame interview rooms.

### INTERVIEW POLICY

All interviews with UTSA student-athletes and coaches must be arranged at least 24 hours in advance by contacting the Athletics Communications Office. Telephone interviews are available to the media on a "call-back" basis ONLY and at a time that is convenient for the interviewee. Contact information (i.e., cell phone numbers) for student-athletes and coaches WILL NOT be provided to the media.

### FOOTBALL MEDIA AVAILABILITY

During the season, UTSA football coaches and student-athletes will be available during a Monday Media Roundtable session and post-practice on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. All requests should be made at least 24 hours in advance, or preferably by noon on Sunday of game weeks, to help expedite the process.

### MONDAY FOOTBALL MEDIA ROUNDTABLE

UTSA will host a media roundtable session each Monday of a game week on the Main Campus. Head coach Larry Coker will be available from 9:30-10 a.m., while requested student-athletes will be available from 10-11 a.m. Contact Assistant AD for Communications Kyle Stephens for more details and parking instructions.

# UTSA TO FACE NEW SET OF CHALLENGES IN FIRST AND ONLY SEASON AS MEMBER OF WAC

The first "official" year of UTSA Football went off better than anyone could have envisioned. The Roadrunners won four games and set NCAA startup program records for inaugural game (56,743) and single-season average (35,521) attendance. Most importantly, however, they established the foundation for future success with a brief, one-year stint in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) looming in 2012.

UTSA welcomes back 46 letterwinners and a total of 21 starters (10 offense/9 defense/2 kickers) from last season's inaugural squad. With the climb to the Football Bowl Subdivision taking place in just the program's second year of existence, that should help ease the transition.

However, that change will put a new set of challenges in front of the Roadrunners, maybe even more than what they faced in their initial campaign, but head coach Larry Coker is embracing the hurdles that his club surely will encounter this fall.

UTSA was picked to finish seventh in the Preseason WAC Poll, but to a man, the Roadrunners are using that as motivation, even going as far as embracing the motto, "Shock The Country," for the 2012 season.

"We have our work cut out for us this season, but one of the best things about college football is facing challenges and overcoming them," Coker said. "We have several players back from a year ago and they are excited to show the country that they belong in the WAC. We had a great offseason in the weight room and if the first two weeks of fall camp are any indication, we should be competitive, just as we were a year ago."

The 12-game schedule (two more contests than last season) will put UTSA to the test right away with a Thursday, Aug. 30, tilt at South Alabama. The Jaguars handed the Roadrunners a 30-27 setback in double overtime last year at the Alamodome, so payback will be on their minds. UTSA also will be in search of its first road win in school history when they take the field in the season opener.

The Roadrunners welcome Texas A&M-Commerce to the Alamodome the following Saturday (Sept. 8) for the 2012 home opener and Northwestern Oklahoma State (Sept. 22) and McNeese State (Nov. 10) also will visit the Alamo City as non-conference foes this fall. Meanwhile, UTSA will make additional non-league road trips to Georgia State (Sept. 15) and Rice (Oct. 13).

The WAC slate kicks off on Sept. 29 at New Mexico State and other conference tilts away from San Antonio include Louisiana Tech (Nov. 3) and Idaho (Nov. 17). San Jose State (Oct. 20), Utah State (Oct. 27) and I-35 rival Texas State (Nov. 24) will come to the Alamodome in UTSA's first and only season as a member of the WAC.

### Quarterbacks

Junior Eric Soza returns after taking nearly every offensive snap last fall. Playing for the first time since his senior year of high school, the Beeville native completed 172-of-307 passes (56 percent) for 2,148 yards and 14 touchdowns and he added 285 more yards and three scores on the ground.

Junior Tucker Carter and redshirt freshman Ryan Polite have been battling for the top backup spot during fall camp and sophomore John Simmons returns after connecting on 5-of-6 passes for 49 yards and a TD in limited action a year ago.

### Running Backs

Junior Evans Okotcha returns after rushing for a team-leading 326 yards on just 50 carries (6.5 avg.) last fall. He added four TDs and also caught 10 passes for 148 yards and another score. The Coppell native is expected to see time at both tailback and halfback

(UTSA's version of a fullback) this season.

Sophomore Brandon Armstrong added 171 yards on 25 totes (6.8 avg.), including 105 in last year's season finale against Minot State. Meanwhile, classmate David Glasco II reached paydirt a squad-best five times, including scores in each of the team's first four outings.

The Roadrunners also welcome back junior CheRod Simpson, who rushed 10 times for 27 yards and also hauled in seven passes for 79 yards and a score. A pair of true freshmen, Treston Coleman and Brian Vaughn, may contribute in their inaugural season.

Sophomore Nate Shaw and redshirt freshman Terrance Wilburn will see time at halfback when Okotcha moves to tailback.

### Wide Receivers

Arguably the deepest position on the club due to sheer numbers alone, the group is led by sophomore Kam Jones. The former prep quarterback led the Roadrunners with 39 receptions for 578 yards (14.8 avg.) and he scored twice during his redshirt freshman campaign. Jones registered three 100-yard performances and is the most dynamic playmaker on the UTSA roster. Expect first-year offensive coordinator Kevin Brown to find creative ways to get the ball in his hands.

Also back is classmate Brandon Freeman, who hauled in 30 passes for 419 yards (14.0 avg.). He led the receiving corps with four touchdowns, which went for an average of 42 yards.

Sophomores Kenny Harrison (28-209-1), Josiah Monroe (8-86-1), Marcellus Mack (4-34-0) and Earon Holmes (2-27-0) are the other returnees who caught passes last fall.

A pair of redshirt freshmen, Kenny Bias and Sean Hesler, earned positive reviews from the coaching staff as members of the scout team in 2011 and both are expected to contribute this season.

### Tight Ends

With sophomore David Morgan (13-214-2) out for the season due to injury, junior Jeremiah Moeller is expected to step in and provide UTSA with a steady blocker this season.

The New Braunfels native played in all 10 games (two starts) a year ago and he caught a pair of passes for 32 yards.

Sophomore Cole Hubble returns to the position after finishing up 2011 at linebacker, while redshirt freshman Austin Rushing and true frosh Jordan Gray and Trevor Stevens also will vie for playing time.

### Offensive Linemen

The men up front helped the Roadrunners offense average 26.6 points, 364.5 total yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) and

20 first downs per game last season despite being young and inexperienced.

UTSA returns six players who saw action a year ago, including sophomores Scott Inskeep and Nate Leonard, who started all 10 contests at left guard and center, respectively. Meanwhile, sophomore Cody Harris played in all 10 games, including eight starts at right tackle, and senior Patrick Hoog drew starts in the final two tilts at right guard. Harris will move inside this season, while Hoog will slide out to left tackle. Sophomore Payton Rion appeared in eight games (seven starts) at guard, while redshirt freshman Josh Walker, the squad's projected starting right tackle, saw limited action in three outings.

Redshirt freshmen Jaime Bernal and Michael Roberson and true freshmen William Cavanaugh, Cody Cole and Zach Hester all should see snaps during the upcoming campaign.

## Defensive Linemen

The Roadrunners will go as high as 10 deep along the front line and six of those players will bring starting experience with them this season.

The four-man rotation at tackle will feature senior Franky Anaya (14 TT/2 TFLs/1 sack) and sophomores Richard Burge (31 TT/1.5 TFLs), Ashaad Mabry (20 TT/3 TFLs/1 sack/4 QBH) and Ferrington Macon (15 TT/3.5 TFLs/2.5 sacks). All four players saw action in every game a year ago and the quartet combined for 21 starts. Burge led the way with nine, while Macon (five), Mabry (four) and Anaya (three) also drew starts.

Junior William Ritter (14 TT/2.5 TFLs/1.5 sacks) and sophomore Jason Neill (14 TT/4 TFLs/1 sack) are back at end, while junior newcomers Jarron Harris and Dan Winter join senior Lekenwic Haynes and sophomore Dominique Henderson in the pursuit of playing time behind the projected starting duo.

## Linebackers

UTSA uses just two linebackers in its 4-2-5 scheme, but the tandem of senior Brandon Reeves and junior Steven Kurfehs proved to be quite a 1-2 punch last fall.

Reeves started all 10 games in his first season out of the JUCO ranks and led the Roadrunners with 69 tackles. He also was second on the squad with a half dozen sacks and ranked third with 8.5 tackles for loss.

Meanwhile, Kurfehs played in seven games (six starts) before missing the last three contests due to injury. However, he managed to finish third on the team with 61 stops and the San Antonio native recorded double-digit tackles in three of his final five outings. Also a threat when dropping into pass coverage, he recorded a pair of interceptions, including the first defensive touchdown in program

history, a 45-yard pick six, against Bacone.

Sophomore Cody Rogers proved to be a valuable backup following Kurfehs' injury. He started the final three contests (played in nine overall) and finished the campaign with 37 tackles, including a program-record 16 at McNeese State.

Redshirt freshman Drew Douglas is expected to see time behind Reeves after sitting out the 2011 season with an injury, while junior college transfer Brandon Guerrero and sophomore Blake Terry also will provide depth in the middle this fall.

## Defensive Backs

The Roadrunners utilize a bevy of cornerbacks and safeties in their scheme and there is a remarkable amount of depth in the defensive backfield.

Junior Erik Brown and sophomore Darrien Starling, the incumbent starters at cornerback, came out of the spring atop the depth chart, but they are being pushed in fall camp by sophomore returnees Crosby Adams and Alondre Thorn, as well as junior college transfer Maurice Poullard. Brown played in eight games (six starts) following his arrival from Fresno State and he finished the season with 26 tackles and a pair of pass breakups. Meanwhile, Starling started all 10 contests and recorded 35 stops and two interceptions in addition to defending four passes. Adams played in all 10 tilts, including two starts, and Thorn also drew a pair of starts among his nine outings.

UTSA fields three safeties — dawg, rover and free — on nearly every snap and as many as eight players could see action in a given contest.

Sophomore Mauricio Sanchez came out of the spring as the "top dawg," so to speak, but classmate and returning starter Nic Johnston is hot on his heels. Sanchez played in nine games (seven starts) as a true freshman and racked up 44 tackles, while his counterpart recorded 59 stops, including nine for loss, which was the second most on the team. Johnston added three fumble recoveries, two interceptions and a pair of forced fumbles in his 10 starts last fall. Also in the mix for playing time are sophomore Joseph Lizzano and freshman Charles Wort, the younger brother of Oklahoma's All-Big 12 linebacker Tom Wort.

Sophomore Triston Wade came into fall camp with a leg up on the starting free safety job following a true freshman campaign that saw him register 39 tackles, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and a pair of interceptions in 10 games of work (four starts). He currently is backed up by sophomore Brian King, who spent the last two seasons at Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College but has not played since his senior year of high school.

Meanwhile, rover will feature two new faces this year with junior college transfer Cody Berry leading the way. Senior Sean Luchnick also could see time at the position after playing wide receiver a year ago.

## Special Teams

Sophomore Sean Ianno returns after scoring a team-high 64 points in 2011. The former walk-on was good on all 31 of his extra point attempts last season and he also connected on 11-of-18 field goals with a long of 48 yards. He also brings a strong leg to kickoffs and is a threat to put the ball in the end zone at any time.

Sophomore Kristian Stern averaged 40.9 yards on 16 punts after classmate Josh Ward (35.1 avg.) went down with an injury midway through the season and they are competing for the lead job during fall camp. Also in the mix is senior Parker Cundiff.

The return game is led by Harrison, who averaged 26.8 yards on his team-leading 19 kickoff returns last fall. Armstrong and Harrison both are expected to battle for the punt return job leading up to the season opener.

# WESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

**A**fter completing its 50th year of intercollegiate competition, the Western Athletic Conference continues to evolve and feature some of the nation's best programs. One thing that remains unchanged is the persistent nature of the schools in the WAC to advance their programs to contend at the top levels of the NCAA.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's most diverse markets. In addition, the WAC's student-athletes work to achieve the highest levels of success with the academic support of their respective institutions.

The WAC has experienced tremendous success over the years. Since 2000, a total of 43 football teams have been invited to bowl games, including more than half of its teams in 2008 with a record-tying five. The conference has sent teams to BCS bowl games three times since 2006. In men's basketball, the WAC has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Tournament in 24 of the past 29 seasons. In baseball, the WAC has boasted two national champions since 2003. In women's basketball, Louisiana Tech basketball has played in all but three NCAA postseason tournaments during its history.

In 2001, the WAC partnered with ESPN for coverage of football and basketball giving the conference national exposure from one of the most respected broadcast entities in the country. The WAC also officially added WAC.tv in 2006 to give fans streaming internet access to many of its postseason championships including volleyball, soccer, swimming and diving, basketball, softball and baseball.

The WAC is the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to July 27, 1962, when the original six-team league of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming began competition.

The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title and New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy. Fresno State was the last WAC school to earn an NCAA team title when it won the College World Series in 2008.

Since 1962, several changes have occurred. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. The WAC then added San Diego State (1978), Hawai'i (1979) and Air Force (1980). Before 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name. Fresno State was added in 1992, and then in 1996, the women's programs from Air Force and Hawai'i along with six new schools (UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa) came into the WAC. Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Nevada (2000), Boise State (2001) and Louisiana Tech (2001) were added while TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season. In 2005, Idaho, New Mexico State and Utah State joined the WAC after Rice, SMU, UTEP and Tulsa withdrew. Boise State withdrew prior to the 2011-12 season. The current membership began on July 1, 2012 when the WAC added Denver, Seattle, UT-Arlington, UTSA and Texas State to replace withdrawing members, Fresno State, Hawai'i and Nevada.

The WAC has had just six commissioners in its history. Paul Brechler was named the first leader of the conference and held the position from 1962-1968. He was followed by Wiles Hallock (1968-71), Stan Bates (1971-80), Dr. Joe Kearney (1980-94), Karl Benson (1994-2012) and current interim commissioner Jeff Hurd (2012-present).

Presently, the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 19 sports — eight men's and 11 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

The WAC office has been located in the Denver area since the conference's inception with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

# LARRY COKER

**HEAD COACH  
SECOND SEASON  
(NORTHEASTERN [OKLA.] ST. • 1970)**

**L**arry Coker is in his second season as head coach of the UTSA football program and in his fourth year at the school overall.

A two-time national coach of the year, Coker guided UTSA to a 4-6 record in its inaugural season in 2011 despite having a team comprised largely of first- and second-year players. The attention and excitement surrounding the Roadrunners was evidenced by the fan support, as UTSA set NCAA startup program records for opening game (56,743) and season average (35,521) attendance.

Coker has made national headlines for the program since arriving in the Alamo City in March 2009, bringing unprecedented exposure for the university, athletics department and football program. Numerous national stories and “UTSA Football: The Birth of a Program” — a six-part series that aired on FOX Sports

Southwest — have depicted the former Miami head coach’s effort to build an NCAA Division I team from scratch.

The two-time National Coach of the Year has assembled a coaching staff that has more than 100 combined years of experience at the collegiate level.

Coker’s first-ever recruiting class made waves, as it featured nine all-state and 28 all-district performers. He followed that by inking two more heralded groups each of the last two Februaries.

The Okemah, Okla., native helped UTSA land an invitation to join the Western Athletic Conference in 2012 and compile future non-conference schedules that include some of college football’s heavy hitters.

Coker’s expertise was recognized, as he served as an assistant coach for Team Texas under former Dallas Cowboys standout Bill Bates in the 2011 NFL Players Association Game, which featured draft-eligible senior college players.

Before UTSA named Coker its first head coach, he spent two seasons as a college football analyst for ESPN.

Prior to that, Coker arguably was one of the nation’s top head coaches from 2001-06 at the University of Miami (Fla.).

He posted a 60-15 record (.800 winning percentage) in his six seasons, including wins in his first 24 games (first coach since Walter Camp in 1888-89 to do so), and led the Hurricanes to the

2001 National Championship in his first season, becoming just the second coach in NCAA history to do so and the first in 53 years.

Coker was a two-time National Coach of the Year (2001-02), American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region Coach of the Year (2001, ’05) and Big East Coach of the Year (2001-02) honoree.

He led the Hurricanes to a pair of Bowl Championship Series (BCS) title game appearances, three BCS bowl games,





a total of six bowl contests overall and three consecutive Big East Conference Championships from 2001-03 during his tenure.

Coker has coached 26 first-team All-Americans and 96 first-team all-conference picks during his career and also mentored 73 student-athletes who earned academic all-conference accolades. In fact, his 2005 team graduated all 21 players, a total higher than any other program in the country, and the Hurricanes' 84-percent graduation rate a year earlier was far higher than the national average. His teams annually were honored for their excellence in the

Coker has been successful in every stop of his 36-year coaching career, including 22 seasons as an assistant at the collegiate level. He has been on college teams that have made a total of 18 bowl appearances and those squads have been victorious 14 times.

He served as Miami's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 1995-2000 and the Hurricanes won all four of their bowl games during that time.

Prior to his arrival at Miami, Coker spent two seasons at Ohio State (1993-94) as defensive backs coach. The Buckeyes participated in two bowl games during his tenure and were the 1993 Big Ten Co-Champions.

From 1990-92, he was the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma and the Sooners posted two bowl victories while he was there.

Before heading to Norman, Coker spent seven seasons as the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma State from 1983-89. In his seven seasons with the Cowboys, he coached 1988 Heisman Trophy winner Barry Sanders and the team won four bowl games.

**K**evin Brown is in his first season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach and second season in the Alamo City overall. Brown coached the program's tight ends during the inaugural 2011 season.

The Waco native helped the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The offense averaged 26.6 points and 364.5 yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) per game and scored 33 touchdowns last fall. UTSA's tight ends accounted for 262 receiving yards and a pair of TDs, with freshman David Morgan tallying 214 and both scores on 13 catches. The unit also helped the Birds accumulate 1,448 yards and 16 TDs on the ground.



Brown came to UTSA from Texas State, where he served as the Bobcats' receivers coach for the previous four seasons.

Brown helped the Bobcats set numerous school records during his four years in San Marcos. In 2009, wide receiver Da'Marcus Griggs set the newest standard with 80 receptions en route to earning second-team All-Southland Conference honors. All totaled, Brown's wide receivers unit combined to catch 203 passes for 2,657 yards and 21 touchdowns that season.

A year earlier, Cameron Luke was named a third-team All-American after posting 73 receptions for two more records of 1,268 yards and 17 touchdowns. Luke broke his original record that he set in 2007 with 60 catches for 1,035 yards and 12 TDs and was named first-team all-conference.

Brown's corps combined to catch 185 passes for 2,800 yards and 27 touchdowns in 2008, and in 2007, his receivers caught 137 passes for 1,825 yards and 17 scores.

Prior to his tenure at Texas State, Brown was an offensive graduate assistant coach at TCU, his alma mater, for three seasons. Among his responsibilities at TCU were working with the Horned Frogs' offensive linemen, film breakdown

of opposing defenses and charting the opposition's defense from the press box on game days.

During his playing career as a wide receiver at TCU from 1998-2002, Brown caught 39 passes for 567 yards, an average of 14.5 yards per reception. He caught a career-high 16 passes for 208 yards as a senior in 2002 and also had four touchdown receptions during his career.

Brown was a member of five bowl teams. The Horned Frogs defeated USC, 28-19, at the 1998 Sun Bowl and East Carolina, 28-14, in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl. Brown capped his career as a member of TCU's 2002 Conference USA championship team, which beat Colorado State, 17-3, in the AXA Liberty Bowl.

The Horned Frogs made three more bowl appearances while Brown served on the coaching staff. TCU downed Northern Illinois, 37-7, in the 2006 Poinsettia Bowl and edged Iowa State, 27-24, in the 2005 EV1.net Houston Bowl after falling to Boise State by a score of 34-31 in the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl.

**P**erry Eliano is in his second season as an assistant coach at UTSA. He tutors the program's safeties and is in his first year as special teams coordinator.

Eliano helped lead the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The defense allowed just 21.4 points and 126.2 yards rushing per game and forced 21 turnovers (11 fumbles, 10 interceptions), which led to 15 scores. His safeties recovered six fumbles — three by Nic Johnston — and picked off five passes. Additionally, three of the team's top five tacklers were in his unit — Mark Waters (68/2nd), Nic Johnston (59/4th), Mauricio Sanchez (44/5th).



Eliano came to UTSA from Central Arkansas, where he was an assistant coach for defensive backs for five seasons, which was the second of two tenures with the Bears.

Promoted to associate head coach for the 2010 campaign, Eliano mentored 2007 third-team All-America cornerback Tristan Jackson, 2010 Southland Conference co-Freshman of the Year safety Jestin Love and a total of nine all-conference players during his combined seven seasons in Conway. He also attended the NCAA Coaches Academy in Summer 2010.

Prior to his second stint at UCA, Eliano was the secondary coach at Sam Houston State in 2005, where he coached second-team All-Southland cornerback Derrick Harris.

Central Arkansas first hired Eliano in 2003 as the running backs coach and he then moved over to tutor the team's wide receivers the following season.

**A** member of the UTSA staff since 2009, former New Mexico State standout Polo Gutierrez is in his second year as the running backs coach.

Gutierrez helped the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The offense averaged 26.6 points and 364.5 yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) per game and scored 33 touchdowns last fall. UTSA's running backs accumulated 958 yards and 12 TDs on the ground and 390 yards and a pair of scores through the air. The running backs also posted a pair of 100-yard games, as Evans Okotcha rushed for 106 in the Bacone victory and Brandon Armstrong tallied 105 vs. Minot State.

During UTSA's Fall 2010 practice season, Gutierrez was a graduate assistant coach for the offense where he tutored the running backs.

Gutierrez came to UTSA from New Mexico State, where he was an assistant strength & conditioning coach in 2009. He also served as an assistant coach for a pair of NFL Player Development Camps and coached AAU track & field.

A standout offensive lineman at New Mexico State, Gutierrez attended a tryout for the Buffalo Bills and played for the El Paso Generals of the Indoor Football League in 2009.

Gutierrez was a four-year starter for the Aggies from 2005-08. He began his senior season at right guard but switched to right tackle due to injuries along the offensive line. He finished his career by allowing just three sacks in three seasons.

He started all 13 games at right guard as a junior, helping the offense average 331.9 yards passing and 423.5 total yards (fifth NCAA) per contest. Gutierrez was a part of an offensive line that gave up just 24 sacks on the season.

As a sophomore, Gutierrez started every game at right guard. He helped New Mexico State establish 10 school records, including tying the single-season mark for scoring (374 points). New Mexico State finished third in the NCAA in total offense (475.2 ypg), second in passing offense (399.3 ypg) and 15th in scoring offense (31.2 ppg). The Aggies posted five 400-yard passing games, including three with 500 or more yards, and five 100-yard rushing contests.

He began his career with the Aggies as a defensive lineman, tallying 14 tackles as a freshman.

UTSA's receivers accounted for 1,541 yards and 11 TDs, including a team-high 578 yards from Kam Jones and 419 by Brandon Freeman. The unit also posted four 100-yard games, including three by Jones.

Jeffery also oversaw the Roadrunners' special teams during the first season. Sean Ianno made 11 field goals, including a long of 48, and all 31 of his PATs. Kenny Harrison averaged 26.8 yards per kickoff return with a long of 41, while the unit averaged 23.4 yards per return. The special teams also blocked six kicks, three on field goal attempts.



The Houston native served as a quality control coach from 2006-09 for head coach Mack Brown. During his four-year tenure on the Forty Acres, the Longhorns qualified for four consecutive bowl games and finished ranked in the top 10 three times.

In 2006, Texas won the Alamo Bowl against Iowa and finished No. 13 in both The Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Polls. A year later, the Longhorns captured the Holiday Bowl against Arizona State and ended the season at No. 10 in both polls. The Longhorns won the Fiesta Bowl over Ohio State to finish the 2008 campaign with a 12-1 record, fourth in The AP Poll and third in the Coaches Poll. In 2009, UT finished as the Bowl Championship Series runner-up after a loss to Alabama.

714 yards (12.5 ypc) and six touchdowns and carried 25 times for 127 yards and a score in his career. The Klein Forest High School product also was a special teams standout, as he blocked four punts, returning two for TDs, and served as the holder.

Jeffery started all 12 games as a senior in 2004, hauling in 33 passes for 437 yards — both team highs — and three TDs and rushing seven times for 47 yards and a score to help UT to a 11-1 record capped by a 38-37 Rose Bowl victory against Michigan. Jones' unit broke up eight passes and Darrien Starling had a pair of Interceptions.

Jones came to San Antonio after spending two seasons as an assistant coach at Midwestern State in Wichita Falls. He was in charge of the program's secondary and helped the



Mustangs win 17 games and a Lone Star Conference South Division title during his tenure. Four of his defensive backs were honored as all-conference, including second-team All-American and 2009 Lone Star Defensive Back of the Year Micah Hill, in his two years with the program.

In 2010, Midwestern State posted an 8-4 record, including a perfect 5-0 mark at home. Jones

helped the Mustangs' defense record 16 picks, including a team-high three by Neiko Conway.

In his first season with the Mustangs, the defense intercepted 16 passes, including four by Hill, which was tied for third most in the Lone Star Conference. Midwestern State posted a 9-3 record and shared the Lone Star South Division crown with a 4-2 mark. A coaching veteran for more than four decades, including nine years as a head coach, Jim Marshall was hired in March 2010 as an assistant coach. He tutors the program's offensive line.

Marshall helped the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The offense averaged 26.6 points and 364.5 yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) per game and scored 33 touchdowns last fall. The offensive line helped pave the way for 1,448 yards and 16 scores on the ground and allowed just 16 sacks.



Marshall came to UTSA from Incarnate Word, where he served as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach for the Cardinals from 2007-09. **A** coaching veteran for nearly two decades, Neal Neathery was hired in March 2010 as UTSA's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

The Stillwater, Okla., native helped lead the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The defense allowed just 21.4 points and 126.2 yards rushing per game and forced 21 turnovers (11 fumbles, 10 interceptions), which led to 15 scores. Two of the team's top three tacklers were linebackers — Brandon Reeves (69), Steven Kurfehs (61) — and the unit combined for 190 tackles, including 16 for loss and 8.5 sacks, two interceptions (one TD), a pair of fumble recoveries and seven quarterback hurries.



Neathery came to UTSA from Drake, where he served as assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and linebackers coach under head coach Chris Creighton from 2008-09. During his two seasons in Des Moines, Iowa, the Bulldogs posted a 14-8 record and, as defensive coordinator, he guided the Bulldogs to the top 12 in four defensive categories in the final 2009 NCAA Football Championship Subdivision statistics. Drake ranked No. 2 in tackles for loss, averaging 8.8 per game; No. 5 in quarterback sacks, averaging 3.3 per contest; No. 8 in rushing defense, allowing just 90.6 yards per outing and 12th in total defense limiting opponents to 276.5 yards per game. Current UTSA defensive graduate assistant coach Benny Morrison was a standout linebacker for Neathery's defense both seasons.

In 2009, Drake matched the best nine-game start in school history (8-1) en route to an 8-3 record and the Bulldogs also finished second in the Pioneer Football League with a 6-2 ledger. Neathery's defense held opponents to 17.1 points per game and posted 39 sacks, eight interceptions and a pair of shutouts.

In his first season, the Bulldogs allowed just 17.8 points and 266.3 yards per contest and registered 14 picks and three white-washings in a 6-5 campaign.

He was the associate head coach at Wabash College from 2001-07 and was named the 2007 American Football Coaches Association NCAA Division III Assistant Coach of

**A** veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks for nearly three decades and a knowledgeable recruiter for more than 20 years, Eric Roark was hired in April 2009 as one of UTSA's first assistant football coaches. He tutors the program's defensive linemen.

Roark helped lead the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record during their inaugural campaign in 2011. The defense allowed just 21.4 points and 126.2 yards rushing per game and forced 21 turnovers (11 fumbles, 10 interceptions), which led to 15 scores. Roark's defensive linemen registered 156 tackles, including 27 for loss and 15.5 sacks, broke up or deflected



19 passes and posted 13 quarterback hurries. Marlon Smith led the team with eight sacks, while Jason Neill had one of the team's two interception returns for a touchdown, a 67-yarder in the season finale against Minot State.

In his first year in the Alamo City, Roark was instrumental in helping the program sign its first-ever recruiting class. The group featured nine all-state and 28 all-district performers. The second class included nine all-state and 25 all-district players. He also was influential in helping former UTSA track & field All-American Teddy Williams ink a free-agent

contract with the Dallas Cowboys in July 2010.

He was an assistant coach at SMU for six seasons (2002-07) and spent 2008 as the defensive coordinator at Grand Prairie High School.

While at SMU, Roark coached the secondary and defensive ends, coordinated special teams and also served as recruiting coordinator for four seasons. Under his tutelage, the punt team finished second in the nation in 2007 and he coached All-Conference USA punter Thomas Morstead (a fifth-round draft pick by the New Orleans Saints in 2009), linebacker Justin Rogers (a sixth-round draft pick by the Dallas Cowboys in 2007) and defensive end Cory Muse. He was named the fifth-best non-BCS recruiter in the country by *Rivals.com* in 2005.

Roark spent the 2001 season at Tennessee under former head coach Phillip Fulmer, where he served as a graduate assistant in football administration. He helped the Volunteers win the Southeastern Conference East Division Championship and Citrus Bowl that year.

Prior to his time in Knoxville, he coached defensive backs and was the recruiting coordinator at Tennessee Tech from 1997-2000 under current Atlanta Falcons head coach Mike Smith, wide receivers at Middle Tennessee from 1989-97 and defensive backs and wide receivers at Murray State in 1987-88.

Reust also worked with the Nebraska wrestling program, which was ranked in the top five of the country and rated as high as second in the Big 12 Conference.

While in Fort Worth, Reust helped lead the men's basketball program to its first postseason tournament in 10 years. # LYNN HICKEY

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

### (OUACHITA BAPTIST • 1973)

Lynn Hickey has made student-athlete welfare one of her top priorities as she continues to work to bring the UTSA Athletics Department to the upper echelon of the NCAA Division I standings.

Under Hickey's direction since 2000, UTSA has captured two Southland Conference Commissioner's Cups as the league's top athletics department and two men's and one women's all-sports trophies while consistently winning both team and individual academic and athletics awards in all 17 sports sponsored by the university.

One of Hickey's dreams to lead UTSA to the upper echelon of Division I Athletics was realized on Nov. 11, 2010, when the university received and accepted an invitation to join the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) beginning on July 1, 2012. Hickey's long-term goal of placing UTSA in a major conference was reached when Conference USA extended an invitation on May 4, 2012. The Roadrunners will move all 17 sports into that league on July 1, 2013.

Hickey has overseen the addition of three sports during her tenure. Women's golf and women's soccer were added in 2005 and 2006, respectively, and both programs have emerged as annual league championship contenders. On Dec. 18, 2008, UTSA's Athletics Initiative Business Plan was approved by the UT System Board of Regents, granting permission to start a football program. Hickey made a splash with the hiring of the first-ever head football coach, as two-time National Coach of the Year Larry Coker was introduced on March 6, 2009. The program kicked off its first season against Northeastern State on Sept. 3, 2011, to resounding success. The Roadrunners set NCAA start-up program records for inaugural game (56,743) and average home (35,521) attendance in six games at the 65,000-seat Alamodome.

The 2010-11 academic year will go down in history as arguably the most successful in school annals, as the Roadrunners claimed the Southland Commissioner's Cup and Women's All-Sports Trophy, five championships and the first-ever NCAA postseason victory. UTSA followed that with four more league titles during the 2011-12 campaign, giving the department 36 total championships since 2000-01.

Hickey has led the charge for UTSA and its hosting of numerous NCAA Championship events. Since her arrival on campus, UTSA has served as host institution for the 2001 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional, 2002 Women's Final Four, 2003 Men's Basketball South Regional, 2004 Men's Final Four, 2005 Women's Volleyball Championship, 2006 Women's Basketball South Regional, 2007 Men's Basketball South Regional, 2008 Men's Final Four, 2010 Women's Final Four, 2011 Men's Basketball Southwest Regional and 2011 Women's Volleyball Championship.

In 2007, Hickey was named to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee, one of the most prestigious appointments in all of collegiate athletics. The 10-member committee oversees administration of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship, including the selection and seeding of teams for the tournament. Hickey became just the second female ever selected to the committee, joining UNC Charlotte Athletics Director Judy Rose, who served from 1999-2003.

Hickey has been honored nationally and locally for her hard work at UTSA. She was named the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators 2005 Division I-AAA Administrator of the Year. Hickey earned her second national award in June 2006 as the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics/GeneralSports TURF Systems Division I-AAA West Region AD of the Year. The San Antonio Express-News tabbed her as its 2010 Sportswoman of the Year and she also was selected to and completed the Masters Leadership Program of San Antonio and Bexar County. In September 2011, she received the ATHENA Leadership from the North San Antonio Chamber of Commerce.

"UTSA is very fortunate to have an athletic leader with both the administrative and coaching experience of Lynn Hickey," UTSA President Dr. Ricardo Romo said. "Lynn not only is a leader who can take our athletic program to the next level, but she is also well respected nationally and serves as an excellent role model for all student-athletes at this university."

In serving as the fourth athletics director in UTSA history, Hickey assumed the lead athletics role at one of the youngest NCAA Division I universities in the country (UTSA began athletics competition in 1981). The only female Division I athletics director that oversees both men's and women's sports in the state of Texas, she served as President of the Southland from 2002-04 and as the league's representative to the NCAA Championship/Competition Cabinet. Hickey also was a member of the Women's Basketball Rules Committee from 2003-06, spending the last two years as chair.

Hickey came to San Antonio from Texas A&M University, where she served as senior associate athletics director/senior woman administrator from 1994-2000. At Texas A&M, her responsibilities included event management and marketing and promotions for 16 of the university's 19 Division I sports. She also represented the Big 12 Conference as a member of the NCAA Championship Cabinet.

From 1984-94, Hickey served as head women's basketball coach for Texas A&M. She directed the 1993-94 Aggies basketball team to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, becoming the lowest-seeded team to ever reach that milestone. Texas A&M finished the year ranked No. 19 in the CNN/USA Today Top 25 poll. Following the season, Hickey relinquished her coaching duties to accept the promotion to senior associate athletics director. She finished her coaching career with an overall mark of 279-167 in 15 years of collegiate coaching.

Before her stint at A&M, Hickey was head women's basketball coach at Kansas State University from 1979-84. She averaged more than 23 wins per season in posting a 125-39 (.762) record over five years and led the Wildcats to five consecutive national tournament berths. She was inducted into the Kansas State Athletics Hall of Fame in September 2004.

A native of Welch, Okla., Hickey graduated summa cum laude from Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Ark., with a bachelor's degree in education. She was an All-American for OBU's nationally-ranked basketball team and a member of the USA National Team in 1973. Hickey and her husband, Bill, have one daughter, Lauren Nicole.





# DR. RICARDO ROMO

## UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

### (TEXAS • 1967)

Ricardo Romo is the fifth president of The University of Texas at San Antonio, one of the fastest growing institutions of higher education in Texas and the nation. During his tenure as president, which began in May 1999, UTSA has become an institution of first choice for students seeking a university degree.

Under his leadership, student enrollment has risen to more than 31,000, representing 68 percent growth in enrollment. The university has added numerous programs and facilities to enhance student life and expand its research capacity. UTSA was named one of the state's emerging research universities by the Texas Legislature with annual research expenditures of \$56 million and sponsored program expenditures of \$70 million for fiscal year 2010, representing a six-fold increase in expenditures during Romo's tenure.

A San Antonio native who grew up on the city's West Side, Romo graduated from Fox Tech High School before attending the University of Texas at Austin on a track scholarship. At UT Austin, he was the first Texan to run the mile in less than four minutes, a record that lasted 41 years.

He earned a bachelor's degree in education from UT Austin (1967) and holds a master's degree in history from Loyola Marymount University (1970). Additionally, Romo earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of California, Los Angeles (1975). A nationally respected urban historian, Romo is the author of "East Los Angeles: History of a Barrio," now in its ninth printing (one in Spanish).

Romo began his academic career teaching social studies from 1967 to 1970 at Franklin High School in Los Angeles. He went on to teach at the University of California at San Diego (1975-1979) and the University of Texas at Austin (1980-1999). He was a visiting professor at University of California, Berkeley in 1985 and visiting scholar with the Stanford University Center for Advanced Studies in Behavioral Sciences

(1989-1990). In 1993, he became vice provost for undergraduate education at UT Austin before becoming president of UTSA in 1999.

Romo has received numerous awards and recognitions including 2006 Outstanding Friar Alumnus from the UT Austin Friar Society and the Isabel la Catolica award, the highest award given to non-Spanish subjects, bestowed upon him in 2007 by King Juan Carlos of Spain. In 2008, Romo received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Texas Exes Alumni Association.

In 2010, he received the San Antonio North Chamber Gov. Dolph Briscoe Salute to Excellence Award. In 2011, Romo was presented the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Chief Executive Leadership Award for transforming UTSA from a regional campus into an emerging Tier One research university. In February 2012, Romo received the Colonel W.T. Bondurant Sr. Distinguished Humanitarian Award from the San Antonio Academy of Texas Alumni Council.

With a strong commitment to serve the community, Romo has served on a range of regional, national and international boards. He is vice chair of the Southwest Research Institute Board of Directors and on the boards of the American Council of Education, Philosophical Society of Texas, Humanities Texas, Austin Museum of Art and United States-Mexico Commission for Educational and Cultural Exchange (COMEXUS). In May 2011, President Barack Obama appointed Romo to the President's Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanics.

Romo is married to Harriett Romo, a UTSA professor of sociology. She also serves as director of the UTSA Mexico Center and the Bank of America Child and Adolescent Policy Research Institute (CAPRI). Both first-generation college graduates, the Romos have a son, Carlos, who earned degrees from Stanford University and the University of Texas School of Law. Their daughter, Anadelia, a graduate of Princeton University, received a doctoral degree from Harvard University and teaches at Texas State University.

The Romos are avid art collectors. Their private art collection is particularly strong in works on paper by Chicana/o and U.S. Latino artists with a regional focus on Texas and the Southwest. The collection includes works by Luis Jimenez, Carmen Lomas Garza, Cesar Martinez and Vincent Valdez, as well as print suites from Self Help Graphics and Coronado Studio.

A talented photographer, Romo's photos have been included in numerous regional art exhibits including "Havana," a collection of photos taken in Cuba, and "South Africa," a selection of his photos taken on a trip to rural South Africa. His "Small Town Texas" exhibit was displayed at the UTSA Institute of Texan Cultures.

An assortment of his photos were featured in China's most respected photography magazine, Popular Photography. Consequently, Romo recently returned from China where he and four other Texas photographers showed their work in the exhibit "Infinite Horizons: Visions of Texas," initiating a Texas-China cultural exchange program.

# 2011 UTSA GAME CAPSULES

## GAME 1 — SATURDAY, SEPT. 3 UTSA 31, NORTHEASTERN STATE 3 SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS (ALAMODOME)

**SAN ANTONIO** — Larry Coker resumed his head coaching career with the quick start that resembled his first job a decade ago.

Coker's UTSA team won its first football game, defeating Northeastern State, 31-3, on Saturday.

Eric Soza threw for 237 yards and ran for 102 more, accounting for three touchdowns (2 pass/1 rush), as the Roadrunners scored on their first three possessions before an NCAA start-up program record crowd of 56,743 at the Alamodome. South Florida held the previous modern record with 49,212 on Sept. 6, 1997, against Kentucky Wesleyan.

Coker won his first 24 games as coach at Miami (Fla.) and led the Hurricanes to the 2001 National Championship. Saturday looked like 10 years ago when his players emptied a large drink bucket on him as the final seconds ticked away.

Just seconds after he led his team onto the field, as fireworks showered with the school's colors of blue and orange, Coker saw his offense promptly drive down the field for the program's first-ever score.

Coker, who went 60-15 (.800) in six seasons at Miami, witnessed opening plays that could not possibly have gone any more smoothly for a first-year program.

After Kam Jones returned the opening kickoff 37 yards to the UTSA 45-yard line, Soza ran 14 yards for UTSA's first touchdown, then connected with Jake Wanamaker for a 6-yard scoring toss and Jones for a 3-yard score before the first quarter had ended.

UTSA's defense also contributed early.

Strong safety Nic Johnston broke through the line and delivered a hard hit to stop Northeastern's Joel Rockmore for a 5-yard loss. The RiverHawks didn't get a first down until the last play of the first quarter.

Sean Ianno kicked a field goal as time expired in the half, giving the Roadrunners a 24-0 cushion heading into the locker room.

Soza completed 17-of-29 passes for 237 yards, was not intercepted and sacked just once.

Northeastern State, a Division II independent, only managed a 22-yard field goal by Dylan Beers in the third quarter.

## GAME 2 — SATURDAY, SEPT. 10 McMURRY 24, UTSA 21 SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS (ALAMODOME)

**SAN ANTONIO** — Jake Mullin threw a 32-yard touchdown pass to Delfonte Diamond with 19 seconds remaining to give McMurry a 24-21 win against UTSA in front of 31,634 fans at the Alamodome.

The Division III War Hawks took a 17-14 lead with 7:07 to go when Markell Rice recovered a blocked punt and ran eight yards for a score. UTSA came back to lead four minutes later when David Glasco II ran seven yards for a touchdown with 3:02 remaining on the clock.

Mullin, who completed 29-of-45 passes for 372 yards and one interception in addition to running for a 1-yard score, then found Diamond for the game-winner.

Diamond finished with game highs of seven receptions for a career-best 142 yards.

Eric Soza was 15-of-28 for 255 yards and two touchdowns for the Roadrunners. He also ran a dozen times for 51 yards, as UTSA racked up 487 total yards, including 232 on the ground.

Meanwhile, the Roadrunners limited McMurry to just three rushing yards on 20 attempts, but the War Hawks amassed 372 through the air.

Marlon Smith led UTSA with nine tackles, including four sacks, and he also broke up three passes and blocked a 22-yard field-goal attempt by Jesse Garcia in the second quarter.

## GAME 3 — SATURDAY, SEPT. 17 SOUTHERN UTAH 45, UTSA 22 CEDAR CITY, UTAH (ECCLES COLISEUM)

**CEDAR CITY, Utah** — Eric Soza's 10-yard touchdown pass to David Morgan put UTSA on the board first, but Southern Utah responded with 38 unanswered points en route to a 45-22 victory on Saturday night at Eccles Coliseum.

Soza led a 12-play, 76-yard scoring march on the game's opening possession, but it was all Thunderbirds (2-1) from there, as the Roadrunners (1-2) dropped their first-ever contest away from the Alamo City.

Zach Sorenson connected with Decker Alexander for a 26-yard scoring strike to tie the game at seven and back-to-back rushing scores by Austin Minefee, first from 14 yards out and later from the 1-yard line, put Southern Utah up by 14 points. Sorenson's second TD pass of the night, a 3-yarder to Jared Ursua, gave the Thunderbirds a 28-7 advantage at the half.

Dion Turner's 33-yard interception return at the 12:48 mark in the third quarter made it 35-7 and Colton Cook's 36-yard field goal a little more than two minutes later extended the lead to 31.

David Glasco II ended the drought with an 8-yard run to paydirt with 6:41 remaining in the third period, which gave him three touchdowns in as many games this season. Tevin Williams scored from nine yards out in the final quarter and Soza's 2-point conversion toss to Brandon Freeman pulled UTSA to within 16.

Ursua's second touchdown grab of the night, this time from 24 yards out, finished the scoring.

Sorenson completed 20-of-28 passes for 287 yards and three scores, as the Thunderbirds outgained the Roadrunners, 423-294.

Steven Kurfehs led the UTSA defense with a career-high 13 tackles (8 solos/5 assists).

## GAME 4 — SATURDAY, SEPT. 24 UTSA 54, BACONE 7 SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS (ALAMODOME)

**SAN ANTONIO** — Evans Okotcha rushed for 106 yards and a touchdown and the UTSA defense held Bacone scoreless for more than 50 minutes in a 54-7 rout of the Warriors.

Okotcha carried the ball eight times for a 13.2-yard average en route to becoming the program's first running back to rush for more than 100 yards.

The Roadrunners ground attack piled up 216 yards and three scores on 45 carries (4.8 avg.), as UTSA racked up 416 yards of total offense on the day.

Meanwhile, the UTSA defense forced five turnovers — three interceptions and a pair of fumbles — and held Bacone, an NAIA team from Muskogee, Okla., to just 260 yards of offense.

It was the first Warriors miscue of the afternoon that led to the first UTSA points.

After Ezell Brown muffed a 47-yard punt at his own 11-yard line and Nic Johnston recovered at the seven, Soza scooted in from seven yards out on a keeper on the first play.

The defense forced a three-and-out on Bacone's next possession and a poor punt gave UTSA the ball at the 36. David Glasco II capped a six-play drive with a 1-yard rush on the first play of the second quarter for his team-leading fourth touchdown of the season.

Following another three-and-out, Soza connected with Brandon Freeman for a 63-yard scoring strike that helped give the Birds a 21-0 lead.

Steven Kurfehs then picked off a Mike Cook pass on the Warriors next drive and returned it 45 yards for the program's first-ever defensive touchdown.

The defense forced another three-and-out to help set up UTSA's next scoring march.

On 4th-and-1 from the Bacone 39-yard line, Okotcha broke through the line and raced to the end zone to put the Roadrunners up by five touchdowns.

Sean Ianno drilled field goals from 21 and 45 yards out later in the second quarter to push the advantage to 41-0 at the half.

Ianno added two more field goals — from 25 and 42 yards out — in the third stanza, extending the lead to 47-0.

Mike Wilburn hauled in an 18-yard pass from Simmons early in the fourth quarter to make it 54-0.

Bacone broke up the shutout with 9:11 to play in the fourth when Cook found Anthony Ezell for a 71-yard touchdown pass over the middle.

Flanders put the game out of reach seven-and-a-half minutes later when he reached paydirt from 10 yards out.

Soza connected on 26-of-52 passes for 217 yards and three interceptions, while Kam Jones caught seven for 103 yards to become the first receiver in program history to eclipse the century mark.

Steven Kurfehs led the UTSA defense with 13 tackles (9 solos/4 assists), including one for loss, and he also forced a fumble and intercepted a pass for the second game in a row.

After Christian Benvenuto missed wide right from 48 yards out to start the extra session, Evans Okotcha set up Ianno's third field goal of the day with three rushes for nine yards on what turned out to be UTSA's first and only possession of overtime.

The Panthers (2-6) jumped out to a 14-0 advantage on a pair of big plays in the second quarter.

Donald Russell reversed field and raced past the Roadrunners defense for a 24-yard rushing touchdown with 6:28 remaining in the opening half.

Kelton Hill then connected with Albert Wilson on a 54-yard scoring toss a little less than three minutes later to silence the announced crowd of 25,977.

Ianno connected on his first field goal of the afternoon, a 30-yarder, with six seconds left on the clock and Georgia State took a 14-3 lead into the locker room.

After the two teams went scoreless in the third quarter, Chris Johnson scored from nine yards out to pull the Roadrunners within five and Eric Soza's pass to Brandon Freeman on the two-point try made it 14-11.

UTSA got the ball back with 1:59 remaining in regulation and Soza drove the Roadrunners 50 yards to set up Ianno and the Pflugerville native sent the contest into overtime with a 39-yard field goal with 24 seconds to go.

Soza was 17-of-34 for 189 yards, while Kam Jones caught a team-leading six passes for 52 yards.

Russell led Georgia State with 87 yards on 21 carries, while Hill added 46 on 11 totes in addition to completing 6-of-15 passes for 91 yards.

The Roadrunners allowed just 255 total yards, their best effort of the season, and Nic Johnston led the way with 11 tackles, two-and-a-half of which went for loss. Marlon Smith and Mark Waters also were in double figures with 10 apiece.

## GAME 9 — SATURDAY, NOV. 12 MCNEESE STATE 24, UTSA 21 LAKE CHARLES, LA. (COWBOY STADIUM)

**LAKE CHARLES, La.** — Andre Anderson rushed for 158 yards and a touchdown on 26 carries and McNeese State held off a late UTSA rally in a 24-21 victory.

Anderson became the first running back to eclipse the century mark against the Roadrunners, who fell to 3-6 on the year.

The Cowboys (5-5) scored the game's first 17 points before the UTSA offense came alive.

Josh Lewis' 30-yard field goal with one tick remaining in the opening quarter gave McNeese State an early 3-0 lead.

Champlain Babin's 5-yard rushing touchdown midway through the second period stretched the advantage to 10 and Anderson's 21-yard scamper a little less than four minutes later made it 17-0.

Evans Okotcha capped a six-play, 61-yard drive when he plunged into the end zone from one yard out with 39 seconds left in the half, which pulled UTSA to within 10.

Eric Soza's 7-yard scoring toss to David Morgan late in the third quarter cut the advantage to 17-14.

After Sean Ianno's potential game-tying 48-yard field goal was short midway through the final stanza, the Cowboys responded with an eight-play, 69-yard march that culminated with a 29-yard touchdown pass from Darius Carey to Josh Jordan, which put McNeese back in front by 10.

The Roadrunners answered a mere 45 seconds later when Soza connected with Jake Wanamaker on a 26-yard strike to make it 24-21, but the Cowboys were able to run off all but seven seconds to essentially clinch the three-point win.

Kam Jones set program records with eight receptions for 120 yards and it marked his third 100-yard performance in the last five games.

Meanwhile, Cody Rogers paced the defense with a school-record 16 tackles.

## GAME 10 — SATURDAY, NOV. 19 UTSA 49, MINOT STATE 7 SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS (ALAMODOME)

**SAN ANTONIO** — UTSA erupted for 21 points in the first quarter and never looked back en route to a 49-7 victory against Minot State in Saturday's season finale at the Alamodome.

Jason Neill picked off a Bryce Jorgenson screen pass on Minot State's opening possession and the 6-foot-3, 250-pound defensive end rumbled 67 yards to paydirt to get the Roadrunners' (4-6)scoring parade started.

Evans Okotcha extended to the lead to 14 a little more than four minutes later when he broke through the line for a 77-yard touchdown on UTSA's third play from scrimmage.

The advantage grew to 21-0 on the Roadrunners' ensuing possession when Kam Jones finished off a five-play, 48-yard drive with a 22-yard scoring jaunt.

Minot State got on the board with 8:53 remaining in the opening half when Tyson Schatz reached paydirt from two yards out, but that was all the Beavers got the rest of the way.

It was all UTSA after intermission, as Eric Soza connected with Brandon Freeman and Josiah Monroe on 33- and 14-yard scoring tosses, respectively, in the third quarter.

David Glasco II and Nate Shaw finished off the rout with short touchdown runs in the final stanza.

Brandon Armstrong rushed for 105 yards on just 10 carries, while Okotcha added 79 on his three totes, as the Roadrunners set a program record with 289 on the afternoon.

Meanwhile, Soza completed 18-of-27 passes for 178 yards and two scores.

Mark Waters had a game-high 12 tackles in his final game as a Roadrunner.

The game drew 32,369 fans and that helped UTSA break the NCAA record for average attendance for a first-year program. The Roadrunners welcomed 35,521 fans per game to the Alamodome during the 2011 season.
